



Library search box

- The search box allows you to search the Library's collections via a single entry point. In this tutorial we will look at performing a keyword search and review the features on the results page.



- Enter your search term in the search box on the Library homepage. Click the 'Journal articles' radial and click the search icon. Enter your University credentials if prompted
- If a research starter is available for your search term, it will appear at the top of the results list. Research starters provide a brief overview of a given topic, with links to relevant articles and images, sourced from high quality reference sources, such as Encyclopaedia Britannica.



- To refine your search results, use the 'Limit to' options in the left hand panel. Results can also be refined using the facets, such as source type, language and publisher. These are also found in the left hand panel. Click on 'show more' to see more options.
